

Capetonian Warren Gans tentatively steps into the void on Table Mountain. In order to capture the full extent of the athlete within the landscape, I scrambled onto a high outcrop overlooking the slack-line and shot this image with a longer 28-300mm Nikon zoom lens.

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


BO-KAAP COLOUR

The old cannons with their massive barrels above Red Hill, in Simon's Town, made for an interesting shooting location. Lukas tightens up his laces while Warren walks the line. One of my Nikon SB-900 flashes, triggered by a Pocket Wizard transceiver, adds appeal to the image.
